Reading underpins the whole curriculum. We do not send weekly homework at Pinewood as our aim is for the majority of home learning to centre around the skill of reading. ### How we already promote reading:



Our library bus is a lovely place to share our wonderful stories during lessons, during play times and even sometimes after school. Every class is scheduled throughout the week and can choose a library book to take home to share.


















We use the reading track to promote reading at home. We want our children to read daily but at least 5 times a week at home and each time they read they move on a space on the reading track. They receive treats every multiple of 10. When they get to 100 you are invited into our wonderful reading celebration assembly where the children receive a gold book worm broach and a certificate. When they read 150 times in a year they are invited to summer reading Camp which is so much fun. It runs after school in year groups where children undertake wonderful activities. Sometimes this includes a Carnival, sometimes a fire and

marshmallows, sometimes a PJ party. 200 reads at home in a year means a brand new book that we purchase for the children and invite you into a special assembly again







When children move up a book band they visit Ms Otter for a Book Monster sticker and a chocolate treat from the pot! Children love this!






Another way to encourage reading at home is with the reward of the OTTER box weekly in each class. OTTER stands for:

### Our Time To Enjoy Reading

A child is chosen each week who has read at home well or has shown great progress in school with reading. They can snuggle up with the otter and a hot chocolate and biscuit whilst sharing a very special book from the suitcase with you. Again, the children love this!

Each year group has a core group of quality texts that are age appropriate. These are called 'Pinewood Brilliant Books'. Classrooms also have brilliant books from previous years so that Children Can read old favourites with increasing independence. We share these stories with the Children before we place them in the book corners.



We have a collection of books which match our school values – these are promoted around school in story times

We focus on authors and encourage the children to find out about them. We also make sure authors come into school like Nottinghamshire's Elizabeth Baguley! We are going to aim for the best-selling author Matt Haig this year as his Mum was Ms Otter's Head Teacher for 10 years so she knows him and he has written a wonderful children's Christmas book. Perhaps he could read us his book over Teams!







## Our vision for reading is that our children leave Pinewood:

- With a true love of reading and of quality texts.
- Reading fluently with good comprehension skills, being able to access the KS2 curriculum.
- Understanding what it means to be a good reader, a belief that they are good readers and a knowledge of how they can get even better.
- Frequently choosing to read for pleasure.
- With a good knowledge of books and authors.
- Having experienced our top Pinewood favourite Children's books.

## New ways to further promote reading September 2022...



- 4. Train up more reading volunteers at school. We have a family member of one of our children who gives up some time each day to read with 3 children towards the end of the school day. If you have any time you could give us to help with this or have a willing granny or grandad then please contact Ms Otter.
- 8. Book club/library club lunch time once a week in
- 4 week blocks to support reluctant home readers.

- 1. Ms Otter contact all parents on Seesaw whose children are already falling behind with their reading at home to ask for support and to see if we can help in any way. By week 3.
- 5. Contact all parents at the end of each half term if their child is falling behind on reading track and work with parents to increase reading at home.

9. New reading diaries (KS1 initially) to further promote importance of home reading. The proof arrived today they are going to be very good even though expensive so please keep very safe!

- 2. Invite all F2 parents/Carers into an early reading and phonics assembly. All attendees will be offered a bus pass to come and share a story with their child on the bus at a convenient time.
- 6. Offer bus reading drop in day for parents/Carers to drop into school to share a book with their child on the bus. It is such a wonderful resource to have on our school site.
- 3. All teachers to join reading track themselves after October half term so that all reluctant readers at home have to chase their teacher around the track.
  - 7. Try and set up reading lunch time buddies from Killisick Junior School to read with targeted Children. Ms Otter to contact Mrs Carpenter.
